Ways projectors can be utilized in a lesson

- Introduction Activity
 - Something to gain student interest- a picture, animation, or video clip related to the subject.
- Illustrating/Teaching a concept
 - You can find animations and video illustrations on the Internet, Discovery Education, A+
 - Of course you can just present text in a Powerpoint. Powerpoint is infamous for being misused as a way to present information in bulleted format.
- Drill, Practice and Review
 - Drill and practice with Flashcards, Games, Tables, and Charts. Games are a great way to review vocabulary.
- Evaluation
 - You can write true false, multiple choice, short answer, and essay questions in PowerPoint and then choose the time you want each question to display on the screen.
 - Use already prepared tests from Discovery Education, A+, or other sources on the Internet.

The Big 4 Resources:

- Power Point
 - Creating Your Own Resources
 - Putting text into a PowerPoint presentation can be done very quickly. The outline Tab on the left-side window allows you to type and paste text quickly.
 - There are many sources on the Internet to help teachers create their own Power Point resources. Here are two:

- Textbook Resources
 - Your textbook materials will often include a cd/dvd with Power Point materials to supplement your lessons.
 - Search for your textbook company on the Internet. Then follow the links to find more online materials to supplement your lessons.
- Finding the resources you need on the Internet
 - Search for a specific topic and then include “.ppt” to find downloadable Power Point presentations and templates.
 - Search large education sites (portals) such as:
 - [Discovery Education](#), [Thinkfinity](#), Here's a guide to [finding education portals](#).
- A+ Whole Group Learning: Do you have a log-in? What is it?
 - Study Guides- teach concepts and skills with each lesson.
 - Practice Exercises- work through exercises while providing feedback and access to the s.g.
 - Mastery Tests- determine whether the student has learned the lesson.
 - Essays- usually done away from the computer.

 - Use a video clip as part of a lesson. (38,658 educational video segments available). Search for clips by subject, grade level, or AZ curriculum standard. Discovery education Streaming also includes quizzes and tests over the material watched.
