Snow Days/Late Starts/Emergency Early Releases

In cases of inclement weather and other emergencies, any decisions will be made district-wide by the superintendent. Snow days, late starts, and early emergency releases will be announced on KNNB and other radio stations. In the case of a late start, the school will begin two hours later, so 10:45 a.m. instead of 9:00 a.m. for elementary schools. Breakfast will not be served.

Health Office

In order for students to be treated, they must have a Medical Release form on file. The Medical Assistant will contact parents/guardians if children need to go home due to illness. Any medications students take at school must have a parent permission form.

All WUSD school health offices employ credentialed personnel that provide routine health services. Credentials range from Certified Nursing Assistants (CNA), Licensed Nursing Assistants



(LNA), Medical Assistants (MA), or Nationally Certified Medical Assistants (NCMA). They are required to maintain First Aid and CPR as well as fingerprints with their certifications through their certifying agencies.

Illness

Students who present to the Health Office with a fever of 100.4 F or higher or who have thrown up will be excluded from school. When a child has an active fever or is actively vomiting, they are considered highly contagious. To prevent the spread of illnesses, the student cannot return to school until they have been fever and vomit free for at least 24 full hours, without the use of fever-reducing medication (Tylenol/Ibuprofen).

Medications

Our schools have standing orders for certain medications that can be administered at school. These medications are all medications you can purchase over the counter without a doctor's prescription. At registration, you will either give consent, or not, for our Health Aides to administer these over the counter medications when needed for your student, per our doctor's approved standing orders. Stomach aches cannot be treated with medication at school. This is to prevent masking of symptoms that could be potentially life threatening.

Medication Administration packets need to be completely filled out in order for any medications brought in by a parent/guardian, to be administered at school. The parent's and the doctor's signatures are required for all medications that are brought in by parents/guardians.

NO MEDICATION WILL BE GIVEN WITHOUT THE EMERGENCY CONSENT FORM OR MEDICATION ADMINISTRATION PACKET SIGNED, UNDER ANY CIRCUMSTANCES UNLESS THEY FALL UNDER THE EMERGECNY USE UNDER OUR STANDING ORDERS.

Statewide Nutrition and Wellness Policy

Per state law, K-8 students must follow healthy guidelines. If you would like to provide healthy food/snacks for your child's class to celebrate his/her birthday, you must make your request in writing a week prior to the date. The party request form is available in the front office.

Breakfast and Lunch

The Whiteriver Unified School District is with the National School Lunch Program. This means breakfast and lunch are free for all students for SY 2025-2026. New students are still required to complete the meal status forms. Your child/ren will receive free breakfast and lunch meals every school day without having to pay a fee or submit a household application.

Your child/ren's school is approved to operate the Community Eligibility Program (CEP). No action is further required of you.



<u>Alcohol and Drug-Free Zone</u>

Cradleboard Elementary, like all schools in the state, is an alcohol and drug-free zone. This includes after-school events on school property. We will notify the authorities immediately if this law is violated at after-school events.

Electronic Devices

District Cell Phone and Electronic Device Policy

Personal electronic devices are disruptive to the education environment therefore as required by the Children's Internet Protection Act and Arizona Revised Statute 15-120.05 the following policy applies to all students attending Whiteriver Unified School District schools:

Elementary School-Kindergarten to Grade 5

- Personal electronic devices are not allowed at school.
- Students will be restricted from accessing the district's network but will have necessary access associated with instructional programs and assessments.
- Parents may contact students by calling the front office.
- Students may request the front office staff to contact their parent.
- Travel updates for sports and other school activities will be sent out via Bloomz and social media.
- Emergency communications will be sent out to parents via the Bloomz communication platform-text messages, phone calls as well as social media posts. Students will be allowed to contact parents from a school phone when safe to do so.
- Students requiring a personal electronic device due to a medical condition or other extenuation circumstance must have a written IEP, 504 or administrator approving the use of such device.

Violations of District Cell Phone and Electronic Device Policy

If a student if found in violation of the policy the following consequences will be given:

- First Offense-warning and parent contact
- Second Offense/Repeated Offense-confiscation of the device and device will be release to the parent at the end of the school day.
- Repeated Offenses-may be considered "Insubordination" and progressive discipline will be followed according to the Discipline Policy.





<u>District- Wide Backpack Policy</u>

All schools will enforce a clear bag/backpack policy. All bags must meet the following criteria:

- Backpacks must be transparent made from plastic, vinyl, or PVC
- Pockets must be transparent, no hidden or covered pockets are allowed
- Tinted or semi-clear material is not allowed
- Print or labels must not obstruct the view of the contents in the bag
- Students are allowed a 4x4 or smaller personal hygiene kit
- Athletic bags do not have to be clear and must be checked in upon arrival to school and will be stored in a secure location
- Administration has the discretion to determine whether a backpack meets the allowable criteria
- Backpacks not meeting the criteria will be confiscated and required parent pick up at the end of the school day.

School Dress Code

The District encourages students to take pride in their attire as it relates to the school setting. Students should dress in a manner that, in addition to the following guidelines, takes into consideration the educational environment, safety, health, and welfare of self and others.

- Only tailored shorts and skirts that are hemmed may be worn and are no more than 1 inch above the knee in grades kindergarten(K) through twelve (12).
- Bare midriffs, halter tops, and spaghetti straps are not acceptable.
- Clothing should fit students appropriately, not excessively baggie or inappropriately tight.
- Pants will have no holes above the knee that expose skin.
- Bare feet are never acceptable. In the interests of student safety, shoes must be worn at all times. Closed shoes are to be worn for any type of physical activity, such as physical education, et cetera.
- Jewelry shall NOT be worn if it presents a safety hazard to self and/or others.
- Profanity or defamatory writing on clothing or jewelry is **NOT** acceptable.
- NO bandannas of any color, size, or shape may be carried or displayed in any classroom or at any school activity. This also includes simulations of anything representing gang-related clothing, including red, royal blue, and other colors deemed gang-related.

- **NO** hats/ hoodies may be worn in a classroom, except for properly approved occupational safety headgear required for special classes.
- NO gang-related personalization is permitted on hats on items of clothing.
- Obscene language or symbols or symbols of drugs, sex, or alcohol on clothing are expressly **prohibited**.

Exceptions for special activities or health considerations may be pre-approved by the administrator.

Students who volunteer for extracurricular activities, such as athletics, band, chorus, etc., are subject to the standards of dress defined by the sponsors of such activities.

Visitor's Policy

All parents and visitors must report to the office to sign in and may receive a visitor's pass. Parents and visitors heading to a classroom MUST go to the office and check in with the office staff first.

Attendance

If your child is absent for any reason, bring in a note or call the school. Based on state law, office staff will determine if it is an excused or unexcused absence.

<u>Good attendance is really important</u> for your child's education, for the money our district receives from the state to pay for your child's education, and if your child wants to earn attendance rewards. Poor attendance is in violation of the Tribal Code. Unexcused absences will result in the following actions:

<u>Tardiness</u>

Children are considered tardy after 8:45 a.m. Excessive tardiness hurt a child's education as much as absences. When students come in late, they must check in at the front office to receive a tardy pass and have their time entered in our computer

attendance system. Please refer to the chart to know when your child's lateness results in a tardy or an absence. Significant tardiness will result in the following actions:

Attendance/Tardy/Check-out Chart

Excessive check-outs hurt a child's education as much as absences. Times are based on our school schedule and the number of instructional minutes required by the state for each grade level. Please remember that even if your child is late or checked out and may be counted present for a full day legally, he/she still needs to be here from 8:45 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. to receive the best education. Note that depending on the times, a student who arrives late **AND ALSO** leaves early could result in a full-day absence. The latest checkout should be made by 3:00 p.m. for the safety of students and staff at dismissal.

Change of Destination

If your child requires a change of destination, please send a note with your child, or contact the front office by **12:00 p.m**. Monday thru Thursday so arrangements can be made.

FERPA

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) is a federal law that protects the privacy

of student education records. The law applies to all schools that receive funds under an

applicable program of the U.S. Department of Education. FERPA gives parents and eligible

students (18 and over) the right to inspect and review the student's education records maintained by the school, to ask that they be corrected if believed to be misleading or

inaccurate, and requires the school to obtain permission before releasing information from a

student's education record to anyone other than school officials with a legitimate interest, a

school to which a student is transferring, audit officials, financial aid officials for specified

students, organizations conducting certain studies on behalf of the school, accrediting

organizations, the court system, health and safety officials, and the juvenile justice system.

FERPA also dictates that Directory Information may be given out upon request without consent. Directory Information consists of the student's name, address, telephone listing, date and place of birth, e-mail address, photograph, grade level, major field of study, dates of attendance, enrollment status, participation in officially recognized activities and sports, weight and height if student is a member of an athletic team, honors and awards received, and the student's most recently attended education agency or institution. Parents and eligible students have the right to opt-out of sharing Directory Information. During the annual online student enrollment process parents have the opportunity to indicate what if any directory information is to be disclosed. Parents and eligible students can provide written request to the school data coordinator to make changes.

Parents Right to Know

As the parent of a student in the Whiteriver Unified School District, you have a right to know the

professional qualification of the teachers who instruct your child and ask for the following

information about each of your child's classroom teachers:

- Whether the State of Arizona has licensed or qualified the teacher for the grades and
- subject he or she teaches.
- Whether the teacher is teaching under an emergency permit or other provisional status by which state licensing criteria have been waived.
- The teacher's college major and whether the teacher has any advanced degrees and, if so, the subject of the degrees.
- Whether any instructional aides or similar paraprofessionals provide services to your child and, if they do, their qualifications.

You also have the right to know:

(i) information on the level of achievement and academic growth of your student, on State

academic assessments required; and

(ii) timely notice that the student has been assigned, or has been taught for 4 or more consecutive weeks by, a teacher who does not meet applicable State certification or licensure requirements at the grade level and subject area in which the teacher has been assigned.

If you would like any of the information above, please contact the school administrator



Progress Reports

Each mid-quarter progress report is accessible over Synergy. Progress reports will show how your child is doing so far academically and behaviorally. If you have any questions, you can contact your child's teacher.

Report Cards

Report cards are given to parents each quarter at Parent/Teacher Conferences and sent home with students at the end of the year. Any report cards not picked up are mailed. Report cards will show how well your child meets the state standards in each subject.

The following scale will serve as a guide for the distribution of grades:

Awards and Recognition



Monthly

Student/s of the Month

Teachers chooses students who exemplify outstanding qualities both academically and personally. This recognition is not only about academic achievements but also about character, making it a comprehensive accolade that celebrates well-rounded students.

Quarterly

PBIS Recognition

PBIS (Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports) Recognition is a rewarding system designed to acknowledge students who exemplify the four core pillars of PBIS: Respect, Responsibility, Safety, and Excellence. Students earn tickets for demonstrating behaviors aligned with these pillars, reinforcing positive actions within the school environment.

The names of students who receive tickets are entered into a draw for prizes, adding an element of excitement and appreciation for their commendable behavior. This system not only celebrates individual achievements but also promotes a culture of positivity and mutual respect throughout the school.

Attendance

<u>Perfect Attendance</u>- This award is designed to honor students who have demonstrated exceptional commitment and responsibility by maintaining 100% attendance for the entire quarter – **NO tardiness**, **NO early checkouts**, **NO absences- excuse or unexcused**.

<u>Loyal Scout Attendance</u>- This award is given to students who had not more than 2 absences/ tardiness in the entire quarter.

Semestral

Honor Roll

This award is given to students who received a grade of **Highly Proficient and Proficient** on 1st and 2nd semester cumulative grades.

Awards and Recognition



End of the Year

Principal's Award

This award is given to students who received a grade of Highly Proficient in ALL academic subjects.

Academic Excellence

This award is given to students who received a grade of Highly Proficient and Proficient in their academic subjects.

Citizenship Award

This award is given to students who consistently follow the 4 Pillars of PBIS (Respect, Responsibility, Safe and Excellence).

Students must have **NO discipline referral** the whole year.

Academic Improvement

Students who showed MOST improvement and growth in Reading, Writing, and Math throughout the year.

Attendance

<u>Perfect Attendance</u>- This award is designed to honor students who have demonstrated exceptional commitment and responsibility by maintaining 100% attendance throughout the school year – **NO tardiness, NO early check-outs, NO absences.**

<u>Loyal Scout Attendance</u>- This award is given to students who had no more than 2 absences/ tardiness throughout the school year.

Homework

Your child will be assigned homework each day or each week. Please check with your child's teacher about the class's homework procedures. Homework is an excellent opportunity for you to practice with your children what they are learning in school.

Reading

K-5 is using the myView Literacy by Savvas. Accelerated Reader (AR) and Lexia Core 5 are programs we use to encourage independent reading practice. Students read and then take a comprehension test on a computer to earn points and incentives. Other supplemental reading materials are also used to meet the academic needs of students.

Writing

Students are using the myView Literacy writing embedded program.

Math

K-5 will be using McGraw Hill Reveal Math. This program is very hands-on and encourages higher-level thinking skills.

Science and Social Studies

Teachers focus on the key areas of Reading, Math, and Writing but integrate these important subjects and use various materials. In the future, the district plans to include these subjects in the textbook adoption cycle.

Structured English Immersion Program

Students may enter this program if they have a Primary or Home Language Other Than English based on the Home Language Survey parents complete at registration. Students are tested with the Arizona English Language Learner Assessment (AZELLA) in oral, reading, and writing skills. If it shows they are not proficient in English, they are placed in the Structured English Immersion Program. Whiteriver Unified School District 20 uses SEI Pull Out Model. This includes 60/50 minutes of targeted ELD (English Language Development) instruction and 60/50 minutes of minutes of integrated ELD instruction within content classes.

Ancillaries

Our ancillary classes include Apache Language and Culture, Library, Art, STEM, and P.E.

Testing

All students K-5 will take the WUSD district assessments using Renaissance DnA and AIMS Web Plus in subject areas of Reading and Math. Kindergarten students take one-on-one assessments throughout the school year. Statewide-mandated testing will be in April for grades 3-5. Other assessments include AIMS Web Plus Progress Monitoring, Fountas and Pinnell (F&P) Reading, Lexia Core 5, as well as benchmark assessments and other assessments for our MTSS initiative. 5th grade also takes the AZ State Science test.

Technology

We are very fortunate to have a variety of technology. Each classroom has computers for AR testing, Lexia Core 5, educational games, research, and other purposes. Students will have access to laptops.

Incentives

Classroom and schoolwide incentives will be offered for perfect attendance on a quarterly basis. This includes no tardiness. Students may also earn an opportunity for a curriculum extension trip in the spring. Students can also earn end of the year incentives for AR and Lexia Core. Students will be chosen for Student of the Month based on behavior and academics and earn a reward. Classrooms can earn brownie points by following PBIS expectations, while individual students can earn and collect PBIS tickets that will give them a chance to be drawn during the end-of-the-quarter PBIS assembly.

Curriculum Extension (Field Trip)

Students may participate in course-related extension activities and shall not be denied participation due to financial hardships; however, students with behavioral write-ups are subject to further deliberation. Furthermore, signed permission slips does not guarantee your child's participation.

The following criteria for extension activity participation are mandatory:

- 1. NO suspensions
- 2. **MUST** be present the day before the scheduled trip.
- 3. **CANNOT** be absent for more than 10 days (5 days per semester).

Moreover, teacher discretion for participation in field trips is crucial as it considers factors such as attendance, behavior, and class participation.

Behavior

The district follows a board-adopted district-wide discipline policy. See the summary on the following pages. **Be sure to go over the rules and discipline policy summary with your child.** We also have a school-wide classroom management plan and behavior incentive plan to reward students and classes for good behavior.

4 PILLARS OF PBIS:

- 1. Respect
- 2. Responsible
- 3. Safe
- 4. Excellence

There are also some specific rules/procedures to be aware of:

- 1. Expensive personal items, such as gaming systems, iPad, cell phones, etc., are not allowed at school. They distract the educational process and are easily misplaced, broken, or stolen.
- Personal electronic devices such as tablets, pads, and laptops are allowed if used for educational purposes at the teacher's discretion.
- 3. No gum, sunflower seeds, permanent markers, drinks, or other non-preapproved food is allowed in the classrooms.
- 4. Students must report arson, assault, fighting, bullying, harassment, theft, vandalism, weapons, and drugs/tobacco/alcohol immediately to the nearest adult. Failure due to so means the student was aiding and abetting in another student's violation of the rules/laws.

Whiteriver Unified School District Student Discipline Policy

The following pages are board-adopted district-wide student discipline policy. All serious student behaviors are in this handbook on the K-2 Discipline Matrix and 3-5th Discipline Matrix. Students who commit one of these infractions are sent to the principal's office with a completed **WUSD Student Disciplinary Referral Form**, also in this handbook. The principal selects consequences for the students by following the student's grade level matrix. There is a range of choices for each occurrence, marked by bullets. Please review the two matrices carefully, as you can see that the consequences are very serious, and they get more serious as the student continues to commit the infraction. The principal may contact the parent immediately based on the infraction and appropriate consequences.

DEFINITION OF INFRACTIONS

Absence from Class - failure to be physically present for all of a class session or required school activity.

Aiding/Abetting - any act that leads to or encourages an infraction on the discipline matrix.

Aggravated Assault - an assault which causes serious injury to another; assault with a deadly weapon or dangerous instrument; assault which causes temporary but substantial disfigurement, temporary but substantial loss or impairment of any body organ, or fracture of any body part.

Aggravated Assault of a School Employee - a person commits aggravated assault if the person who commits assault as defined knows or has reason to know that the victim is a teacher or other person employed by any school and either is on school grounds or is engaged in any professional duties on other school grounds.

Alcohol - any fermented and/or distilled liquor or a substance reasonably believed to be or portrayed by the student as a fermented and/or distilled liquor.

Arson - the attempt to burn any property, to start a fire or explosion, or to promote the continuation of a fire or explosion. Arson does not include teacher-approved class activities such as an approved and supervised experiment in a chemistry class.

Assault - intentionally, knowingly, or recklessly causing any physical injury to another person; knowingly touching another person with the intent to injure, insult, or provoke such person; intentionally placing another person in reasonable apprehension of imminent physical injury.

Breaking and Entering - unauthorized entry into the property of another or into any portion of the school property.

Bullying - occurs when a student, either alone or in concert with others, uses superior strength, power, influence, or advantage deliberately to inflict physical, emotional, or verbal abuse on another student. Bullying includes explicit or implied threats of bodily harm, weapon possession, extortion, repeated insults and/or teasing, assault, social ostracism, sexual harassment, and intimidation.

Bus Behavior – please refer to WUSD Bus Safety Rules

Cheating - the use or attempted use of information, academic work, research, or property of another as one's own. Cheating shall include but not be limited to sharing knowledge during an examination or the unauthorized use of notes or other materials in an examination. Cheating shall also include the willful disobedience of testing rules.

Complicity - the association or participation in any activity or the agreement between more than one individual to commit an act where the act is ultimately committed or attempted by

any one or more of the individuals.

Controlled Substance -

- alcohol:
- any narcotic or dangerous drug;
- glue, paint, or any intoxicating substances that may excite or stupefy an individual or diminish the individual's physical or mental capacity when possessed for such purposes;
- any other potential mind-altering substance, including marijuana;
- drug paraphernalia, as defined by A.R.S. 13-3415;
- Any other substance enumerated in A.R.S. 13-3401, as well as any imitation controlled substance listed in A.R.S. 13-3451. Medication shall not be considered a controlled substance so long as the medication is either 1) prescribed by a physician or used in accordance with the prescription and Governing Board policies or 2) a proprietary medicine as defined in A.R.S. 32-1901(39) when used in accordance with parental instructions and Governing Board policies.

Defiance of School Authority - refusal to comply with a reasonable request by school personnel.

Destruction - damaging, destroying, or defacing school property or the property of any other person.

Disorderly Conduct - conduct that is reasonably likely to disrupt, or that does disrupt, the regular or normal school functions or any school process or activity.

Display of Affection - visible affectionate physical contact that exceeds accepted standards of reasonable public conduct.

Disrespect - display of rude or discourteous behavior toward a school employee.

Disruption of the Educational Process - any conduct that causes, is intended to cause, or is reasonably likely to cause a breakdown in the orderly process of instruction and/or school activities.

Ditching - the failure to attend class without an approved reason.

Drug - a controlled substance as defined herein.

Explosive Devices - any apparatus or substance that is capable of exploding or causing an explosion.

Extortion - the act or practice of obtaining something from a person by force, threatened force, or undue or illegal power or ingenuity.

Failure to Report - the failure to report to school employees or administrators any infraction about which a student has knowledge.

False Information - intentionally giving an untrue communication to any Whiteriver Unified School District personnel.

Fighting - engaging in physical contact for the purpose of inflicting harm on another person.

Firearm - gun, rifle, or similar items, whether or not functional.

Forgery - the unauthorized or untrue making or alteration of a written document or another person's name or signature.

Gambling - to engage in a game or other activity that involves the element of risk or chance with the intention that property will be exchanged based on the outcome of the game or activity.

Harassment - serious or repeated conduct toward an individual that would disturb or annoy a reasonable person under similar circumstances. This conduct could include, but not be limited to, forms of verbal, physical, and/or racial harassment.

Hate Crimes - Any act designed to frighten, harm, injure, intimidate, or harass an individual, which is motivated in whole or part by the student's bias. The student's bias may include, but not be limited to, race, religion, sexual orientation, ethnicity, national origin, disability, socioeconomic status, or appearance.

Hazardous Materials/Dangerous Items - Any item that could be used to inflict damage to a person or property or create a substantial disruption.

Initiation/Hazing - any type of initiation activity conducted on or off school grounds that the school principal does not expressly authorize.

Injury Prone Behavior - intentional, negligent, or reckless behavior with a reasonable possibility of hurting or damaging oneself or others or the property of others.

Insubordination - any action involving defiance or disregard of authority and/or school rules and regulations.

Intimidation/Threat - verbal, written, or physical communications or acts made with the intent or reasonable effect to inflict fear, injury, or damage or to realize a personal gain.

Intoxicating Agent - any controlled substance.

Leaving Campus - leaving school grounds except where generally permitted for all students without receiving prior approval from the proper school authorities.

Loitering - when an individual is present in or about a school after a reasonable request to leave or without authorization or a legitimate reason for being there.

Lying - intentionally giving an untrue communication.

Malicious Damage - conduct intending to cause loss or harm resulting in injury to person, property, or reputation.

Not Pursuing the Course of Study - refusal to follow the established curriculum or syllabus in a particular subject or course of study.

Obscene Statements or Materials - statements, and materials which an average student, applying contemporary school standards, would find, taken as a whole, appeal to prurient interests and, taken as a whole, lack serious literary, artistic, political, or scientific value. The standard is that of the school community with a recognition that students are, as a class, younger and more sensitive than the general adult population.

Paraphernalia - any accessory, apparatus, or equipment that may be used in the manufacture of or utilization of a controlled substance or otherwise as defined in A.R.S. 13-3415.

Physical Abuse - any act intended to cause injury to another that is reasonably likely to cause injury to another or that a reasonable person would find insulting or offensive.

Police Report - the notification to law enforcement authorities that alleged criminal conduct has occurred.

Possession of Stolen Property - to hold an item or items without the permission of the owner.

Profanity - the departure in the use of language from what is normally considered to be acceptable within the environment of a school or school-related area.

Refusal to Identify Self - refusing to give the correct name when requested to do so by school personnel or the use of another person's name to identify as one's own.

Robbery - the unauthorized taking of property of another by force, violence, or threat.

Sale of Intoxicants - the transfer of ownership from one person to another for a price or item of value, any controlled substance.

Sexual Harassment - any unwelcome sexual advance, request for sexual favors or other verbal, written, or physical conduct of a sexual nature that substantially interferes with a student's or employee's performance or creates an intimidating, hostile or offensive school environment.

Sexual Misconduct - public sexual indecency by engaging in one (1) or more of the following: sexual contact, sexual act, indecent exposure, etc.

Solicitation - a person commits solicitation if such person requests, commands, or encourages

another person to provide him or her with information concerning where to purchase or obtain a substance or item, the possession of which is illegal and/or prohibited by District policy. **Tardiness** - arriving at class after the scheduled starting time.

Theft - the unauthorized taking of property owned by another.

Tobacco - ground-up leaves used for smoking or chewing, or manufactured products such as cigars or cigarettes, known to be addictive and dangerous.

Transfer - to furnish, deliver or give away.

Trespass - the unauthorized presence of an individual on school property.

Truancy - absence from an assigned class and/or required school function without a proper and timely excuse.

Unexcused Absence - absence from class without a proper and timely excuse that is approved by school authorities.

Vandalism - destroying, mutilating, damaging or defacing objects or materials belonging to the school, school personnel, or other persons.

Verbal Abuse - Obscene language, name-calling, racial slurs, or derogatory statements addressed to another individual or group of individuals.

Vulgarity - using offensive language, repulsive language, or obscenity.

Weapons - an object in one's possession that is used, is attempted to be used or is commonly used to threaten or inflict bodily harm to another person or destroy property. Weapons also include any object that reasonably appears to another as an item that is being used or that is commonly used to inflict bodily harm on another person or to damage the property of another.

DEFINITIONS OF CONSEQUENCES

1. Reprimand

A formal conference and warning from the school official to the student. Written communication is sent to the parent.

2. Restriction –PCR (Parent Conference Required)

The student will be temporarily moved to a safe, supervised, restrictive area away from the regular academic setting. A parent conference will be required, but a corresponding disciplinary action will incur if a parent/guardian does not respond.

3. Detention A restriction of free time privileges such as recess; time after school may also be used as detention time but should not exceed more than one hour per day. Special assignment occurs when a student is given any additional work to perform that other students in a non-disciplinary situation otherwise are not required to do.

Restriction of bus privileges is the temporary exclusion of a student from school transportation facilities.

Loss of privileges occurs when a student is not allowed to participate in any school activity other than academic classes. This may include extracurricular activities during or after the regular school day.

4. In School Suspension

Removal from the regular academic setting into another area such as a classroom, psychologist's office, or principal's office.

5. Restitution

At the administrators' discretion, the student may have or will be required to serve an alternate consequence which may include but not limited to community service, a letter of apology, fines/fees, groundskeeping, litter control, parent supervision and others.

6. Short-Term Suspension

Removal from school and school-related activities such as; dances, clubs, field trips, athletic events, and others for a specified length of time, not to exceed ten (10) school days.

7. Long-Term Suspension

Removal from school-related activities such as; dances, clubs, field trips, athletic events, and others for a specified length of time, a minimum of eleven (11) school days and a maximum of one hundred eighty (180) school days. The period of long-term suspension may extend into the next school year. Governing Board actions required.

8. Revocation of Enrollment of Open Enrollment Students

For open enrollment students who would otherwise be subject to a long-term suspension or expulsion, the hearing officer has the option to revoke enrollment effective at any time within the school year.

9. Expulsion

Permanent removal of a student from school. Governing Board action is required. Appeal for reinstatement is available and must be approved by and is at the discretion of the Governing Board.

10. Policy

A student shall not commit or attempt to commit, induce or solicit another to commit, or conspire to commit any of the infractions listed in the following matrices. Each infraction listed in the matrices is defined in this policy. The attempt, inducement, solicitation or conspiracy to commit any infraction by a student shall be treated, for the purpose of imposing discipline, as if the student actually had committed the infraction.

11. Suspension Authority

The authority to suspend students is vested in the superintendent, all assistant superintendents, the principal, associate principals, assistant principals, administrative assistants, and assistants to the principal.

Fundraising

The Parent Advisory Committee meets once a month to provide information to parents. All parents are invited to come and participate. Parents provide a potluck. Federal PAC is also at the district office monthly.

Board Meetings

The WUSD Governing Board meets regularly on the second Wednesday of each month. Meetings are open to the public. You may request to speak by filling out a call to the public form before the district office meeting.

Parent Resource Center

Cradleboard has access to educational resources, books, and a computer for parents for student information.

Parent Volunteers

You are welcome to visit your children's classrooms anytime. However, if you are coming regularly, you can complete a district volunteer application and submit a tribal rap sheet for board approval. This is all you must do if your child is in that classroom. Others who may wish to volunteer will need fingerprint clearance. This also applies to parents who will chaperone our students during field trips.
