







Using the Tyler SIS Parent Portal to view your student's grades:



Log in to the parent portal: <https://sis.wusd.us/AZWH360x3/login>


- Your login name is the email address you provided to the school.
- You can always get a new password or choose a password by clicking the “Forgot your parent password” link, even if you didn’t choose a password yet.
- Call your school’s office if your login isn’t working so they can check that we have your email in the system correctly.



Choose the student whose grades you want to see by clicking the ∨ symbol next to the student name at the top of the page.

Click “Go To Grades” to see an explanation of your student’s grades.

All grades for the year for the student are displayed. This screen combines gradebook marks and posted end-of-term grades to give a complete overview of the student’s grading. **Anything highlighted in Green is an in-progress grade and is subject to change as students turn work in to teachers.**



A student’s secondary courses view shows a row for each course that has a grade and a column for each term. Progress grading periods can be turned on and off by using the **Show Progress Grades** checkbox at the bottom of the screen.

Underlined marks are links to the Assignments tile; click to display those details on that tile. Those marks in green boxes are calculated from teachers’ gradebooks but not finalized for report cards. Click the **Arrow icon** for period/course details.

Click Assignments to see what grades students have earned on individual assignments. From the Assignments page, you can also email your student’s teacher. You are encouraged to email or call the school to contact your student’s teacher any time. Teachers answer emails quickly and can talk to parents on their prep but not when they are actively teaching.
